Dear BUA Community,

I am writing this afternoon to express my sadness and concern for the number of violent and tragic events our students experience each week in our national and international headlines. As an educator and as a parent, it is disturbing to consider this unfortunate reality for our students and children today. The most recent events, including the attempted distribution of 14 pipe bombs to political figures, Wednesday's grocery store shooting in Jeffersontown, Kentucky, and Saturday's mass shooting at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, are three of many tragic events in the past several months.

When students already have so much on their minds in their daily lives, it can be additionally upsetting when these types of violent, tragic, and hateful events add to the many weights on their shoulders. I encourage our students to seek emotional support from Mr. Elliser, our interim school counselor (or another trusted adult in the building) if they would like to talk about how these events or others are affecting them.
